Working together for the greater good

The Envirohub’s philosophy is based on encouraging our community to work together for a sustainable planet. It’s a facility to unite, inspire and assist Marlborough youth, families and conservation groups to achieve their environmental goals.

A perfect example of communities working together and one the hub was proud to support was the Massive Marlborough Clean Up. This saw groups, businesses and individuals host or take part in clean ups all over Marlborough to celebrate Seaweed 2018.

Here in Picton, Conservation Kids NZ organised a clean up around the Picton Foreshore and several other local beaches. It would not have been possible without the incredible assistance from other groups, businesses and over 40 enthusiastic youth and adults from our community. The main rubbish collected was cans, bottles and lids (both plastic & glass) and food wrappers. All items that should have been easily placed in the many rubbish or recycling bins around the area. After a morning of hard work the younger participants were treated to an unexpected yet super appreciated surprise from the generous Real Fruit Icecream Truck and Round ‘A’ Minigolf. A free icecream and ride on the merry go round! Community spirit at it’s finest and smiles all round!

The Waikawa Dive Centre carried out an underwater clean up around Shelley Beach and the foreshore. They collected three 250litre wheelie bins worth of rubbish including hundreds of bottles, tyres, metals cans and even the insides of a fridge. Isn’t it incredible that in 2018 there are still people around who think the sea is a suitable dumping ground for a fridge! The underwater rubbish appeared to have come both off boats and from the shore and it included historic as well as recent waste.

Linda Thompson from Plastic Bag Free Picton had a special focus to the clean up which was to investigate the contribution of cigarette waste to the rubbish around Picton. The cigarette butt count was done in preparation of a submission to be presented to the Council this year. In just over an hour more than 4000 cigarette butts were picked up from around town and the Foreshore. " Sadly people do not seem to realise that these butts dropped in the gutters all end up in our oceans and are contributing to the deaths of seabirds and other marine life ".

DOC ranger Wendy Sullivan wanted everyone to get behind the event in whatever way worked for them, by either joining a public clean up or by hosting their own. The community definitely came onboard with more than 110 people spending over 220 hours picking up rubbish. "This goes to show what we can achieve if we work together as a community" said Wendy Sullivan.

Matariki Festival to Warm Hearts in Picton this Winter



Lights, performers, and feasting – Picton will be full of new energy this winter, with plans well underway for a community festival linked to Matariki. The Arts and Heritage Working Group of Picton Smart & Connected is speaking with locals about a new festival, called Matariki – Waitohi/Picton, which will feature a light extravaganza and a mid-winter feast showcasing the best of local produce, with aim to bring the community together to embrace the season.

Our team has been busy working with Te Atiawa volunteers and reaching out to the wider community to get behind the new festival, says Picton Smart & Connected Chair, Chrissy Powlesland. In addition to a feast and a family evening, the group is encouraging other groups to come up with ideas for events specifically aimed at families and children, the heart of the community.



‘This is a wonderful opportunity to build on the relationships we cemented for the America’s Cup parade, and bring together community and business to work on a shared project over winter. Working together for community gain is at the heart of everything we do at Picton Smart & Connected.

‘Imagine Nelson Square’s Sequoia trees lit up with lights, and fire poi performers in the midst of winter. We’re also working with local hospitality operators on the KAI mid-winter feast which will showcase our local produce – like mussels, salmon, paua, wild venison and more.’

The concept came out of an Arts & Heritage public workshop PS&C held last winter. The idea of a Matariki winter celebration was one which gained the strongest support at the time.

Local writer Julie Kennedy sees it as an opportunity to engage the community with the town’s history and its connection with land and sea. Co-leader of the Arts & Heritage Group, she says the concept of Matariki celebrates ‘the end of harvest, being thankful for nature’s basket and looking forward to the coming year with positive intentions’.

‘We hope to have activities in the lead up to a children’s event in July and going forward offer a celebration in the heart of winter which locals and the wider Marlborough region can look forward to.’

The Working Group is looking at holding the KAI winter feast on Saturday 23rd June, which is the evening before the annual MoreFM mid-winter swim; and the family event at Nelson Square on Saturday 14th July. Other organisations are being encouraged to embrace five weeks of celebrating Matariki, through their own events.

‘Our tagline is Picton – Heart of the Sounds. This festival will be all about keeping the heart in Picton, in the heart of winter.’

Colm Toibin's Brooklyn. - a sublime Trans-Atlantic coming of age story.

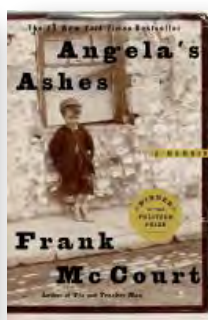
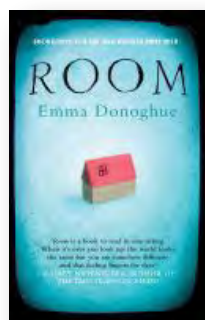
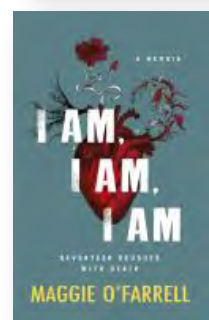
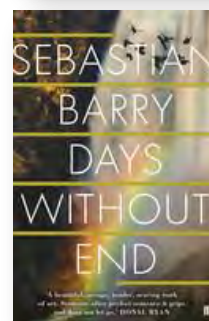
Reading Maeve Binchy is like getting a great big warm hug, so read her whenever you are in need of one...

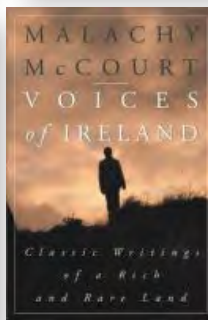
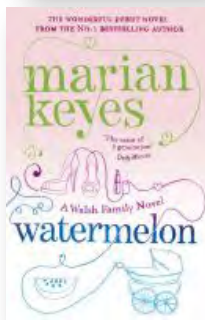


Room by Emma Donoghue is the story of Jack, Ma and Room – a boy and his mother trapped in a room that Jack thinks is the whole world.

Heart of the Sounds – Picton

Picton is flying crisp new flags carrying the clear message that the town is the 'Heart of the Sounds'.

Council upgraded all the pole fittings in High Street last year - now there are 25 of the aqua-and-navy coloured pennants featuring a pair of dolphins strung around the town's CBD.

The branding is the result of a joint effort by the Picton Smart & Connected group and the Picton Business Group, and can be freely used by any business, organisation or group in Picton.



Picton Smart & Connected chair Chrissy Powlesland says the messaging offers both an emotional and geographic reference point; the new flags help generate pride in the town and give a 'sense of place' for Picton.

"It's a great message to have out there, especially with another 10 cruise ship visits scheduled to visit Picton by mid-May. And it's heartening to see the wording already being picked up by businesses as a byline. We look forward to lots of others following suit," she said.

Waitohi Domain Truck Park given the green light

A truck parking facility on Picton's Waitohi Domain has been given the green light with construction set to begin on Monday 12 March.

The decision to opt for a truck park comes as a result of a recent survey conducted by Council which asked for local feedback on the potential future uses for Waitohi Domain.

Marlborough Sounds Councillor Nadine Taylor said a large proportion (75%-78%) of people who completed the survey were in favour of a truck park being built on Waitohi Domain. The facility will ease congestion currently created by heavy vehicles parking in Picton streets.

"Community input in this project has been incredibly valuable. We received a lot of interesting ideas as a result of the survey, many of which are still being looked into, including planting options.

"We are very mindful of the presentation of the truck park; and we will develop a full planting and landscaping plan around the facility and along Dublin Street to beautify the domain frontage and enhance the surrounding area," Councillor Taylor said.

Council Assets and Services Manager Richard Coningham said the Domain had significant limitations in terms of its future use.

"The site was once a landfill meaning it contains potentially harmful soil which restricts its use for some activities. The Domain is also an overflow area for the Waitohi stream during flooding and a large part of it will be retained as floodway reserve," Mr Coningham said.

T C Nicholls Ltd has been awarded the contract for the sealed pavement facility and will begin work on Monday 12 March. Work is expected to be completed by the end of April. Once SH1 is fully operational again and the requirement for a truck park is less, Council intends to rent the area to a suitable tenant to generate a return on its investment.
