Which rat is that?

We now have over 200 people trapping in their gardens. Many have rat traps – but did you know that there are 3 different rat species in New Zealand? Which rat have you caught?

The ship rat (*Rattus rattus*) also known as the black rat, roof rat or bush rat is the most common rat in New Zealand, introduced in the late 1800s. Ship rats are nocturnal and active from dusk until dawn in most weather. They mostly forage in trees, but also on the ground. They are excellent climbers and their habitat reached from the ground to the treetops. They can swim well, up to 500 m. The ship rat's diet is very broad, incorporating plant and animal material, refuse, and stored food. They also predate on eggs and chicks and since they are such agile tree dwellers they pose a big threat to many birds. Ship rats can be wary of new objects and may be initially cautious when a new food is presented.

lizards, eggs and chicks as well as molluscs and crustaceans. They are a particular threat to ground nesting coastal and braided-river breeding birds.

Identification: To check whether you have caught a Norway rat, pull its tail alongside its body. If the tail is short than the body, it is a Norway Rat. Also, it will have small ears that are not big enough to cover its eyes. The ears are lightly haired compared to the ship rat and the tail is thick with a pale underside.

The Kiore (*Rattus exulans*) also known as the Pacific rat was the first rat species to arrive in New Zealand, probably in the late 1200s. Since the introduction of the Norway rat and ship rat, Kiore numbers have seriously declined and they are now the least abundant rat species. They are restricted to parts of the South Island and some offshore islands. Kiore are the smallest of the three rat species, are poor swimmers, solitary, nocturnal and mostly ground dwelling. They have a varied diet of plant and animal matter, including birds' eggs and chicks, particularly of burrow nesting species.

The chance of catching a kiore in Picton is very, very low. If you think you might have caught one, please contact us on 021 2473712.

Identification: To check whether you have caught a ship rat, pull its tail alongside its body. If the tail is longer than the body, it is a ship rat. Also, it will have large ears that are big enough to cover its eyes. The ears are rounded and hairless and the tail is dark.

The Norway rat (*Rattus norvegicus*) also known as the brown rat, water rat or sewer rat is the largest rat species in New Zealand. It arrived before the ship rat in the late 1700s. Norway rats are able to climb, but they spend most of their time on the ground. They are excellent swimmers capable of over 2 km. They are not as widespread as the ship rat and their distribution is patchy, usually found around waterways (coastal and freshwater), in towns and around farms. They have a very varied diet including plants, seeds, insects,

Identification: Kiore have brown fur, with white-tipped grey fur on the belly. They have pale feet with dark mark on outer edge of hindfeet. The ears cover the eyes when pulled forward and the thin tail is about the same length as the body.

It's all hands and paws on board next week as the National Conservation Dog Team is in town! 15 conservation dogs and their handlers will be undertaking systematic searches of the Sounds pest-free islands as part of a proactive approach to ensure the islands stay that way. There will also be two opportunities for the public to see the dogs in action.



As part of our "Conservation Dog Week" there are two events to show off the skills of these talented dog and handler teams and you're invited to come along to these. DOC and Conservation Kids NZ are co-hosting a demonstration at Picton foreshore, at the War Memorial steps, on Thursday 16 November 4-5pm. Please register by emailing conservationkids@hotmail.co.nz.

Koru Native Wildlife Centre sponsored by NZ King Salmon, is building breeding facilities for native species at Smith's Farm Holiday Park in Linkwater. A conservation dog demonstration and an introduction to the project will be held there on Saturday 18 November at 11am.

Preventing pests getting to pest-free islands is one of DOC's top priorities. You can help by checking your bags, boats and kayaks for animals including mice, rats, ants and lizards. Clean all soil and plant materials from your footwear and other gear, as they can carry disease and seeds.

The volunteer committee have been working hard over the last few months putting together another great line up of entertainers and fun on water activities for the 13th Annual festival.

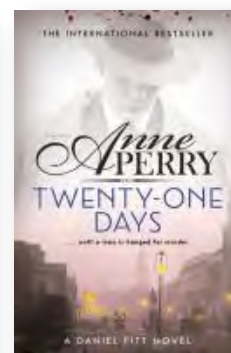
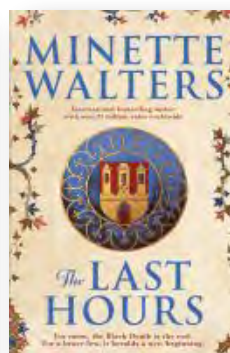
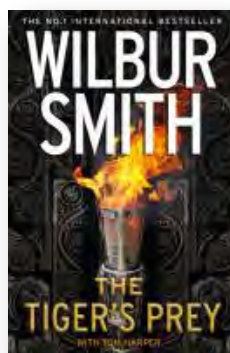
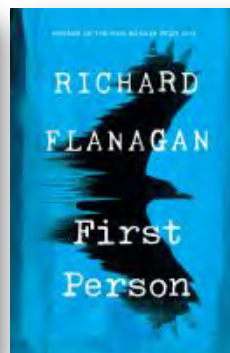
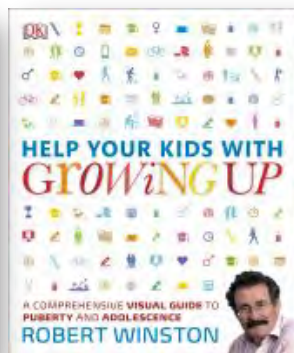
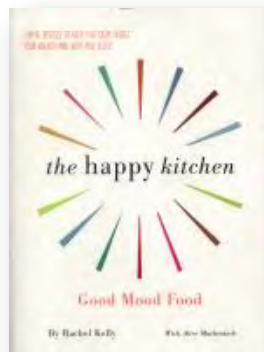
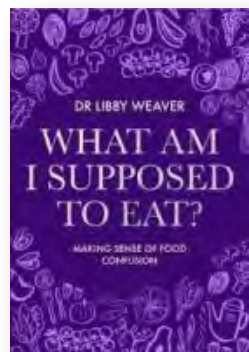


This year we are adding another aspect to the Raft Race where teams of four will be given a pack of items to build their own boat on the day on the foreshore and then race it on the water.

Looking after the Marlborough Sounds

One of Council's main responsibilities is protecting our region's 'jewel in the crown' - the Marlborough Sounds.

Council manages the Sounds so they can be shared by everyone, managing marine activities, allocating water space, and protecting biodiversity and water quality.

Our role is explained on a new information board at the outdoor environmental education classroom at Lochmara Lodge in Queen Charlotte Sound. It's one of a number of signs sponsored by organisations including DoC, MPI, N-Viro, Port Marlborough, NZ King Salmon and the Marine Farming Association.

New SmartMap for Marlborough's high threat pest plants

There's a new digital tool to help people to learn more about Marlborough's high threat pest plants.

The Marlborough District Council has created a new SmartMap so it's easy to see the location and the extent of the pests which are either targeted for control by Council or landowners, depending on the Rules within the Regional Pest Management Strategy.

All 29 pest plants with programmes in the Council's Regional Pest Management Strategy are displayed within the map.

The SmartMap will connect people with information about the status of each pest plant, show where it has been found, photographs, explain what may need to be done and how to deal with it.

These plants range from the farmers' enemies, Chilean needle grass and Nassella tussock, to Moth plant and Madeira vine, plants that could cause serious problems in the Marlborough Sounds if left unmanaged, to one-time ornamental aquarium plants, Parrot's feather and Eel grass, which now threaten our regional waterways.

Totara for Totaranui

Early this month tree-loving volunteers tackled the second springtime big tree planting in Picton's Victoria Domain.

Working in wet and muddy conditions, the small 'Totaras for Totaranui' team from the Guardians of the Sounds organisation managed to plant 205 trees – 55 more than last year's effort.

The Totaras for Totaranui project has a long term goal of replanting native trees in the Marlborough Sounds, to restore some of the million cubic feet of native trees stripped out of the area by our forebears. The first phase of their project is the Victoria Domain, close to Picton.

Next year the plan is to promote the planting opportunity more widely, to encourage more groups and organisations to take part.
